

Do you know the score with the new World Handicap System (WHS)?

2: How will my initial WHS Handicap be calculated?

Your initial WHS handicap on 2nd November 2020 will be based on the average of the lowest 8 of the last 20 scores that you have posted in Qualifying Competitions or submitted as Supplementary Scores.

Only scores submitted since January 2018 will count. With less than 20 counting scores the calculation is adjusted according to the following table:

Number of score differentials in scoring record	Score differential(s) to be used in calculation of Handicap Index	Adjustment
3	Lowest 1	-2.0
4	Lowest 1	-1.0
5	Lowest 1	0
6	Average of lowest 2	-1.0
7 or 8	Average of lowest 2	0
9 to 11	Average of lowest 3	0
12 to 14	Average of lowest 4	0
15 or 16	Average of lowest 5	0
17 or 18	Average of lowest 6	0
19	Average of lowest 7	0
20	Average of lowest 8	0

What happens if I don't have 3 Qualifying Scores posted?

With less than 3 counting scores, the calculation would be done as if you had 3 scores equal to your current club handicap and your new handicap would be equal to your current handicap, minus 2.

For example, with a current handicap of 20, your new handicap would be 18. This is likely to be much lower than it should be and demonstrates why it is **VERY IMPORTANT** to make sure you have at least 3 scores posted before November, and preferably more.

Ideally, you should aim to have between 10 and 20 scores posted so that your new WHS handicap is a good indication of your recent play.
